TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – [Levi Brooks](#) left no doubt about his future as he finished second in the 400m dash finals to automatically qualify for the NCAA Championships, leading the Buccaneer charge in day two at the NCAA East Region Track and Field Championships.

Continuing the progress from the past month, Brooks came on late to break a 22-year old school record, and claim runner-up honors in the 400m dash. His time of 45.75 broke the school record of 46.04 set by Audrey Wilkins on April 12, 1986, making Brooks the first CSU athlete ever to break the 46-second mark.



Having already made history by becoming the first relay team in CSU history to make the East Region finals, the men's 4X100m relay team ran 40.21 seconds in the first track event of the day, claiming seventh place overall in the meet. It was the fourth-fastest time of the year for the squad of [Alonzo Spurley](#), [Cornelius Tyler](#), Brooks and [Michael Rhue](#).

The men's 4X400m relay team of Tyler, Brooks, Spurley and Rhue combined to run 3:07.05, shattering their school record from earlier in the season by more than 1.5 seconds. The team placed third, narrowly (less than half a second) out of a top-three finish and an automatic bid to Des Moines.

Bruce Stanback, the only incumbent to be re-elected to the board, Ken Goodman and Wiley Mabe stood before her honor as Sheriff Dale Furr opened the court proceedings.

All three took their oath to serve the citizens of Richmond County to the best of their ability and to focus on the betterment of the education of the youth in the county.

"This will be my last term," Stanback said. "I will continue to work diligently to further the educational opportunities of children in Richmond County, but this will be my last time I run for election to the board of education."

As Stanback spoke of a continued focus on the education system in Richmond County, Mabe and Goodman also spoke of being ready to face the challenges ahead.

## Beta Chi Sigma Chapter gets cracking with 4th Annual Crabcrack

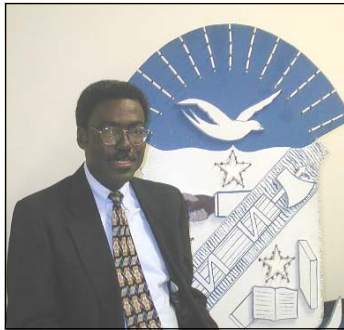

## Parliamentary Corner

In this edition of the newsletter, attention is focused on how rules of order affect meetings and the role of the parliamentarian. Different topics germane to parliamentary procedures will be addressed in future editions.

Meeting rules of order were developed as a means of bringing order to the chaos that can occur in meetings. When used properly, rules can expedite the meeting and ensure that each attendee has an opportunity to participate and to expect that his input will be heard and respected. Henry M. Robert is credited with creating what have become the standard acceptable rules of order; i.e., the *Robert's Rules of Order*. First published in 1876, Robert wanted this book to be simple enough to serve as a guide for meeting participants. *Robert's Rules of Order* to this day serves as the premier authority on meeting conduct. Robert believed that "the object of Rules of Order is to assist an assembly to accomplish in the best possible manner the work for which it was designed. To do this it is necessary to restrain the individual somewhat, as the right of an individual, in any community, to do what he pleases, is incompatible with the interests of the whole."

In most organizations a person is generally appointed by the president to serve as parliamentarian. His job is to serve as a consultant with the primary function of advising the president or meeting chair, as well as other officers and meeting attendees on matters of parliamentary procedures. The parliamentarian's primary responsibility is to simply advise the meeting leader, who is ultimately responsible under parliamentary law for ruling on questions of order or to respond to the parliamentary situation at hand. As parliamentarian he is expected to be impartial and to always display an ability to advise both sides of an issue by using the rules which are the same for both. The foremost job of the parliamentarian is to make sure valuable meeting time is not spent debating procedures, but rather is spent focusing on the issues that are important to those assembled.

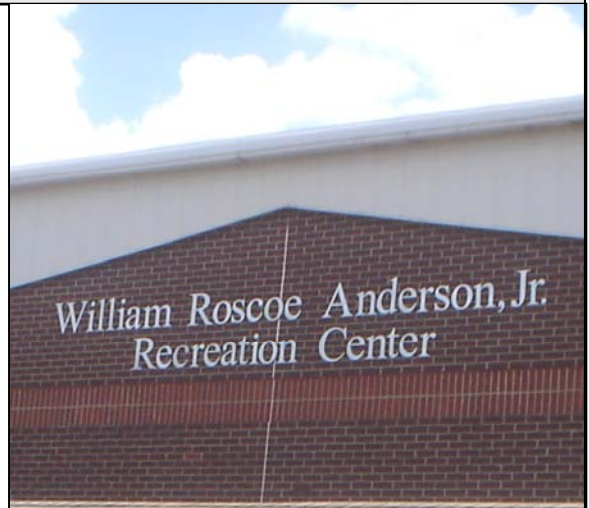
## WILLIAM ROSCOE ANDERSON HONORED WHEN REYNOLDS PARK CENTER IS RENAMED FOR HIM ON SATURDAY, JUNE 28, 2008



Bro. Gerald L. Pauling brought greetings on behalf of the brothers of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc.

William Roscoe Anderson was a charter member of the Delta Alpha Chapter, located on the campus of Winston-Salem State University.

He also shared stories of when Roscoe worked at Kimberly Park Recreation Center and the old Thursday night dances at the center.



For more than 30 years, the name William Roscoe Anderson Jr. was synonymous with Winston-Salem recreation. He started the city's first Special Olympics and wheelchair basketball team, oversaw several recreation centers and served as the city's supervisor for social recreation.

On June 28, 2008, city officials honored that work, renaming the Reynolds Park Community Recreation Center on Reynolds Park Road the William Roscoe Anderson Jr. Recreation Center. "Everyone who comes in this building will be able to learn more about Mr. Anderson," said Tim Grant, the city's recreation and parks director. "He has meant a lot to a lot of people and not a day goes by that I don't think about something he said."

Anderson, who died in 2006, was born in 1912 in Clemmons. He attended Columbia Heights High School, where he lettered in football, baseball, basketball and tennis. He enrolled in Winston-Salem Teachers College in 1932 and helped start an athletics program for men. He played on the school's first basketball and football teams. After graduation, Anderson worked as a teacher and schoolmaster, later serving in the Quartermaster Corps in Europe and the Pacific during World War II. After the war, he joined the city's recreation department.

Malinda Anderson, his wife, said that her husband loved working with kids. He had a well-known sense of humor, she said, but also a commitment to discipline and order. "He saw the need because so many children came from broken homes," Malinda Anderson said. "They looked to Mr. Anderson for whatever their needs were."

Anderson died in 2006 at his home. He was 94. His son, Rusty Anderson, said yesterday that his father would have loved seeing the crowd of almost 50 family, friends and city leaders gathered at the recreation center to honor his work. He just would have wondered what took so long. "He probably would have said, 'Why didn't they do this when I was alive?'" Rusty Anderson said.

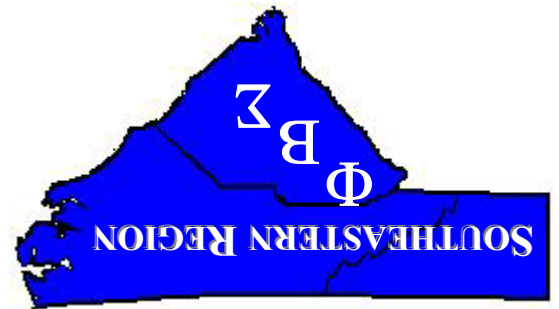
